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

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


On the 7th November 1993 at 16.30hours, I together with Graham James Barker, David Ian Cowie, and Malcolm Cameron Foulds, Radio Investigation Officers, entered the premises of FLAT 1, 16  ROAD, BIRKENHEAD, , together with Police Sergeant 4913 Pattison, and Police Constables 7816, 8685, 6433 and 7961.

Inside the premises we found a radio station which included both studio equipment and a transmitter which when tested proved to be transmitting on 105.1Mhz. The occupants of the flat where STEPHEN , MARK , AND

MARK . Shortly after our entering the premises another person came to visit whose name was MARTIN .

I told them we were officers from the Department of Trade and Industries, Radio Investigation Service, and we were making enquiries into the illegal broadcast station "ZEE 100", I told them I would have to ask them some questions in relation to offenses which we believed had been committed on the premises.

I turned to the person who appeared to be running the operation and I asked him his name, address, occupation, and date of birth to which he replied.

I cautioned STEPHEN [REDACTED] at 16.40hours by saying "You do not have to say anything unless you wish to do so, but what you do say may be given in evidence, you are not under arrest and are free to leave, do you understand the caution?"

A "YES"

Q "Who owns this equipment?"

A "Everyone like"

Q "Who is everybody?"

A "All the people who own the station"

Q "Who are these people?"

A "I would rather not say"

Q "When did you first transmit?"

A "Probably a couple of months ago"

Q "What frequency did you transmit on?"

A "105.1"

Q "Did you transmit last Sunday?"

A "Yes"

Q "Do you transmit on any other day?"

A "Yes, we do the Wednesday as well"

Q "What time did you transmit last Wednesday?"

A "3.00pm to 3.00am"

Q "Did you know you need a licence to transmit on this frequency?"

A "I suppose you would need a licence, yes"

Q "Where did you get your transmitter from?"

A "[REDACTED]"

Q "What is his address?"

A "I don't know"

Q "When did you last transmit with this equipment?"

A "Today"

Q "What did you say when you transmitted?"

A "That we had been raided"

Q "What time was that?"

A "Half four"

Q "How much did you pay for the transmitter?"

A "I don't know - it wasn't purchased by me"


Q "What call sign did you use for the station?"

A "ZEE 100"



I then read back the notes I had made of the interview to STEPHEN [REDACTED] and told him that he could alter or correct anything that he wished. He signed my note book to verify that it was a true and accurate record of the interview which had taken place.

Shortly after my questioning of STEPHEN [REDACTED] I was asked by a person who I now know to be MARTIN [REDACTED] what was to become of the cellphone which my colleagues were examining. I told him I wished to ask him some questions relating to the cellphone, I asked him his name, address, date of birth and occupation, to which he replied, MARTIN [REDACTED], D.O.B. 14TH JANUARY 197[REDACTED], STUDENT.

I cautioned MARTIN [REDACTED] at 17.25hours, by saying "You don't have to say anything, unless you wish to do so, but what you do say may be given in evidence, you are not under arrest and are free to leave. Do you understand the caution?"

A "Yes"

Q "What involvement do you have with Zee 100?"

A "Nothing, just friends"

Q "Who owns the Motorola cellphone we have taken possession of?"

A "I do"

Q "What is the dialling number of the cellphone?"

A "0836 248024"

Q "Why is it on these premises?"

A "Cause I left it here"

Q "What has it been used for whilst on these premises?"

A "People ringing us, us ringing people"

Q "Is that for any specific purpose?"

A "To speak to friends"

Q "Would some of these friends be listeners of ZEE100?"

A "Could be"

Q "Has this cellphone been used to take requests for ZEE100?"

A "Yes, its a vodaphone not a cellphone"


Q "Are you aware that ZEE100 operate from these premises?"

A "Yes"

I then invited MARTIN [REDACTED] to read back the notes I have made of the interview that had taken place, which he did and he duly signed my notebook as a true and accurate record.


I then told him that I considered that offenses may have been committed contrary to the Wireless Telegraphy Act 1949, for which he may be prosecuted and I would be reporting these matters.

My colleague Mr Barker then issued to STEPHEN [REDACTED] receipts for equipment that had been seized, together with miscellaneous photographs and papers which related to the station (see exhibits 2-10). The receipt numbers are as follows:-5901, 5902, 5903, 5904, 5905, 5906, 5907, 5908, and 5909. He also issued a copy of a notice of rights and powers under PACE, and a copy of the search warrant.

We left the premises at approximately 18.20hours.
